Spokane means "Children of the Sun"




OUR VISION

OUR HISTORY



The Spokane ancestors were a river people who lived a semi-nomadic way of life with hunting and fishing.

In 1858 the Spokane's defended their families and

 $country \ as \ U.S. \ soldiers \ marched \ through \ their \ country.$

In 1881, President Rutherford B. Hayes formerly established the Spokane Indian Reservation of approximately 154,602 land acres known as Chief Lot's reservation.

In 1951, the Spokane Tribe officially became one of 574 recognized tribal governments within the United States following the passage of their formal Constitution that governs them today.

Today the Spokane Tribe of Indians primary government operations are located in Wellpinit Washington with a citizen population of approximately 2,900 enrolled members.



The Powpow is the cultural highlight for the Spokane Tribe. They dance their traditional dances, exhibit Indian art and eat their traditional food, for example



fried bread. Tourist are welcome to visit the happy get together and enjoy Indian food or purchase typical Indian art like paintings or sculptures.


